Junior School News

Maths

The students in Junior School have been investigating money. The Preps have been learning about Australian coins and have even been shopping with coins. They have also been skip counting by 5s and 10s. The Grade 1 and 2s are identifying Australian coins and notes, and skip counting by twos, fives and tens. The students are solving practical money problems, involving adding, multiplying and calculating change.





Literacy

The Preps have been practising their letter formation and learning to spell CCVCC words (five letter words). They wrote a note home as a reminder to bring in cutlery and crockery for the Father's Day Breakfast. The 1/2 students have continued to write informative texts about themselves. They have drafted their ideas and then produced good copies in their own personal books. It is great to see the extra detail they are adding to their writing, including a glossary of definitions, to help their readers

In reading, we explored the story Stanley Paste to help us learn how to identify and understand key information in a text. After talking about the characters and main events of the story, we used a story map to retell the story in our own words. This helped us build stronger comprehension skills while enjoying a fun text together.

We are so proud of the confidence, commitment, and enthusiasm the students brought to the stage. What a super effort – well done, everyone!




In reading, we've been diving into a range of **Indigenous mentor texts and Dreamtime stories**. Students have enjoyed discussing and writing reading responses, focusing on:

- Recalling important facts and details
- Identifying themes, morals, and messages in Dreamtime stories
- Exploring characters, settings, and events

We've had some fantastic conversations about the values and lessons shared in traditional stories – like honesty, kindness, patience, and respect for the land.

Inspired by what we've read, students have also started **creating their own Dreamtime-inspired stories**, using nature, animals, and meaningful morals to shape their narratives. Their imaginations are truly taking flight!








In Mathematics, we've been developing our understanding of:

- Number patterns
- Equations with missing addends
- Balanced equations

Students have been using their problem-solving skills to find missing numbers and explain their mathematical thinking clearly. We've been encouraging everyone to look for **patterns**, **strategies**, **and connections** in numbers.

In 3/4 Sport, we've continued to focus on teamwork, fair play, and communication through group and team games. Students are learning how to encourage each other, work towards a common goal, and show great sportsmanship — whether they win or lose. It's been fantastic to see their team spirit grow!

Reading


Last week, all Grade 5/6 students read Paul Jenning's short story 'Strap Box Flyer' and continued to practise using the 'Somebody, Wanted, But, So, Then' strategy to further develop their summarising skills.


Writing

Over the past few weeks, students in Grade 5/6 have been exploring different types of poetry, including limericks, kennings, and free verse. They have enjoyed learning how each style works and trying out their own ideas. From the silly rhymes of limericks to the creative two-word kennings and the freedom of free verse, students have enjoyed playing with words and sharing their poems with the class.












Mathematics

We have been learning about different types of graphs, including column graphs, side-by-side column graphs, dot plots, line graphs, and stem-and-leaf plots. To begin, students practised collecting data by surveying their classmates on topics such as favourite takeaway food, sports played, and number of pets. They then used this data to create a variety of graphs and write factual statements based on their findings. In addition, all students learned how to use Excel to represent a given data set, and here are some examples of the digital graphs they created.





Cyber safety



This week and next week, students will be learning all about cyber safety. They reflected on their use of digital technology and their online activity, listing the different devices they use, how they use them, and how often. We also watched the #GameOn short clip on the eSafety Commissioner website, which highlights the consequences of making poor decisions online. After viewing, students discussed key topics around how to make responsible choices when using technology.

Integrated

This week, students continued to learn about life at the goldfields during the gold rush. We looked at where gold was mainly found and discovered that it was often located in creeks, rivers, and underground. Students explored how miners used different tools and methods, such as panning, cradling, and digging shafts, to search for gold. We also discussed the challenges they faced, including harsh living conditions, long hours of work, and the hope of striking it rich.





Father's Day

While the main casts were busy with their final rehearsals at school, the remaining 5/6 students were hard at work creating something special for Father's Day. Each student put in great effort to design a thoughtful card for their dad, grandpa, uncle, or another special person. They carefully chose their designs, wrote meaningful messages, and decorated their cards with creativity. It was a wonderful way to highlight the importance of showing appreciation and celebrating the people who support and care for us.

Our school production is now complete, and what an incredible success it was! The two big nights were truly amazing, with the main cast giving their very best on stage two nights in a row. We are so proud of the effort, energy, and talent shown by all our 5/6 students. Well done, everyone!






Top Tips for Fathers and Father figures

A few years ago, a group called 'The Fathering Project' created the above book to help Fathers and Father-figures to give children what they most need from male role models.

This was a handy and helpful book. Here are 10 of the tips they shared with us.

- 1] Saying 'I love you' to them: making eye contact, writing them notes, even when they don't expect it.
- 2] Showing them you love them: by spending time with them, hugs, caring for them when they are sick.
- 3] Letting them know that your love is unconditional: it doesn't depend on their performance or behaviour.
- 4] Help them feel special: about their personality, their talents, their creativity, don't compare them to other kids.
- 5] Create special times with them: have Dad dates, movies, walks, shopping, camping.
- 6] Help them realise they have a special future: it will have ups and downs, but it will be their own unique journey.
- 7] Build their confidence: teach them to do things for themselves, encourage reasonable risk, no put downs.
- 8] Make use of time before or after school: drive or walk with them to school, take them out for breakfast, turn off the TV and play board games.
- 9] Weekends and holidays: attend sports, pancakes for breakfast, take them on surprise trips, create adventurous holidays.
- 10] Stimulate their curiosity: encourage imagination, take them to the museum, help them become interested in nature, interesting people and the world.

Have fun trying these out guys. I had a lovely, and chaotic, Father's Day lunch with our 3 kids and 5 grandchildren, also sharing the day with our grandson turning 12. Fun times!
