From the Principal's Desk

I'm feeling incredibly grateful and proud as I write my update this week. Our school community is humming along at every level, and at the completion of a school tour for a potential new prep this week I received some wonderful feedback.

I'll paint a little picture for you. This tour had seven people on it - a mix of adults and students. I began with my usual small talk, and then an explanation of our approaches to teaching and learning. Junior School News

Literacy

For Little Learners, the grade 1 students looked at the phonemes and graphemes for 'ay' and 'ai'. We practised spelling different words, where the students had to make a choice of which grapheme to write, the 'ay' or the 'ai'. We found out that most words, except crayon, will end with an 'ay', while 'ai' is in the middle of words.

Grade 2 Little Learners revised the a sound when spelling including 'a-e' 'ay' 'ai' 'eigh' and 'aigh'. Students enjoyed learning 'The Holiday Game' by revising the sounds from the week and performing a dialogue with appropriate prosody (pattern of rhythm within a poem).

The Holiday Game

Let's play the holiday game. Make a list of the things that can go on the holiday and the things that can't. Can you spot the rule? (Here's a clue- Player 1 likes three beats!)

Player 1:

I have a game that we can play:
'Join me on a holiday'.

Oh! I know! Can I bring insect spray?
Or perhaps I'll bring some model clay?

Player 1:


Hooray! You've won. You can come today!


I'll keep quiet and we'll watch them play.

Writing

For writing, we have continued with writing recounts. We have been sequencing our stories using time connectives such as 'first, then, after, finally'. We read the book 'The Snowy Day' by Ezra Jack Keats, then wrote a recount of a special time we spent with our grandparents, parents, siblings and friends.



The students have been discussing plots, settings and characters after reading the book, 'Edward the Emu' by Sheena Knowles. They also predicted what trouble Edward and Edwina would get up to in the next book!



Maths

We have continued to work on Place Value, focussing on partitioning numbers into hundreds, tens and ones. The students worked with a partner to play 'Race to 50 or to 100' and used base 10 blocks to show their understanding of this concept. The students made paper chains to use as a number line. With a partner, they rolled two dice to get a two digit number, then had to find where on the number line that number would be.




IN GRADE 3/4

The Grade 3/4s have well and truly settled into the routines and schedule of a middle school student. They are becoming more independent each day by staying organised, moving smoothly between tasks throughout the day, and managing classroom expectations.




Wellbeing - Trusted Adult Activity

Students participated in a "Trusted Adult" activity where they identified and discussed some of the trusted adults in their lives. We talked about who they feel safe talking to at school and at home, and then created a hand template to help them recognise the top five people they can always turn to for care, help, advice, or reassurance.




Reading - Visualising

This week, we are reading the book *A Leaf called Greaf* and learning about the reading strategy of visualising. As we read, students practised creating detailed pictures in their minds by using clues from the text and previous illustrations. We focused on describing what we can see, hear and feel in the story, and recording our thinking in our Readers' Notebooks.



Reading - Predicting

Last week our mentor text was a beautiful book called *Grandma's Treasured Shoes*. While we were reading we were focusing on the strategy of Predicting. Predicting is an important reading skill where children use clues from the text to make a smart guess about what might happen next. Before and during reading, students look at the title, pictures, and key words, and think about what they already know. As they read on, they check if their prediction was correct and change it if needed. This helps children stay engaged, understand the text better, and become confident, thoughtful readers. Here are some of our predictions:



My prediction is that Grandma will keep the shoes forever because they are a very old memory of when she had to flee the war and she will definitely want to keep the shoes. - Holly





I predict that she will keep the shoes forever because they brought her to her new home and kept her safe when she escaped the war. - Charlie

My prediction is that the grandma will keep the shoes forever because she escaped danger with them and she became safe with those shoes on her feet. They are probably really special to her and she loves them as they remind her of what her life was once like. - Addi

Maths - Place Value


After a whole week of testing last week, our focus in Maths this week is Place Value. Students will be representing numbers in numeral, word and expanded form, partitioning numbers in different ways, solving addition and subtraction problems using partitioning and ordering numbers up to 10,000 and exploring patterns in how numbers are built.



Writing - Persuasive

During our writing sessions, we have been focusing on persuasive writing. Students brainstormed and created a list of 'for' and 'against' arguments about whether schools should allow children to bring their pets to school. We also used those arguments to write strong introduction paragraphs.

Imagine a world where everybody got to bring their pet to school. I believe students should be allowed to bring pets to school because pets can make you feel calm, pets can make your work more fun and it can help you be more responsible with pets. - Sebastian



What if we could make a change where everyone got to bring their pets to school? I believe everyone who goes to school should bring their pets. Pets can reduce stress and be calm and listen to the teacher. - Charlotte

3/4 Sport

3/4 Sport is something all students look forward to towards the end of every week. Some of the games we have been playing are line tiggly, swamp ball and long base kickball. These games help students build their teamwork and coordination skills. Students consistently demonstrate excellent sportsmanship by including others, offering a helping hand when needed and enthusiastically cheering on their classmates. It has been wonderful to see their positive attitudes, encouragement and teamwork on display each week.



Inner Ninja

Last week, we revised the Friendology program by watching the first session, "Inner Ninja." We talked about how we all feel "butterflies," and students recalled and described a time they experienced that feeling in a friendship. We also discussed Friendship Fires, Mean-on-Purpose behaviour, and the Friend-O-Meter. For our activity, students came up with ways to tame their controllable butterflies by thinking about what they could do in those situations.



IN GRADE 5/6...

What's happening in the Senior school?

Over the last fortnight, grade 5/6 students have been exploring what it means to be a good citizen. They discussed how citizenship is about belonging to a community and understanding their rights and responsibilities, both locally, nationally and globally. Locally, they thought about ways they can help in their neighbourhoods and schools, while nationally they considered respecting laws and participating in community events. Globally, students explored actions like caring for the environment and supporting charities, and digitally they learned about online safety, attending a presentation on the importance of not sharing personal information and being respectful online

In Maths, students focused on all things related to whole numbers, including multiples, factors, prime and composite numbers, prime factor trees, indexed notation, rounding, and expanding numbers. In Reading, students worked on building stamina, monitoring their understanding and using thinking stems to strengthen their responses. Highlights over the past two weeks included making beetroot muffins in Kitchen Garden, preparing for Gala Day in interschool sport, and visiting Boronia K-12 College to take part in high school activities like cooking, robotics, and science experiments where they explored the density of liquids such as milk, honey and water.

We are super proud the way our students showed curiosity, teamwork and enthusiasm throughout all these activities.



- 1] How do you organize a space party? You planet



Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund eligibility

Applications must be submitted to the school as soon as possible and no later than the end of Term 2.

Where a school or family is unsure if the concession card is eligible, they are encouraged to submit the application into the CSEF system for validation.

CSEF payments cannot be claimed retrospectively for prior years.

Queries relating to CSEF eligibility and payments should be directed to the school.

Those who are eligible to apply for the CSEF **must meet both** of the following two criteria or be eligible for special consideration.

Eligible means-tested cards

Only financially means-tested cards are eligible.

Eligibility date

Eligibility will be subject to the parent/carer's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink (refer to the department's policy, Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF)), on either the first student day of Term 1 or Term 2.

Criterion 1 – General eligibility

The applicant must be one of the following:

- a parent or carer who is the beneficiary of a financially means-tested card
- a student over 16 years who is considered a mature minor and holds a valid concession card (such as a Youth Allowance Health Care Card). Applicant to use the 16 and over application form. For guidance on assessing whether a student is a mature minor, refer to the department's policy on Mature Minors and Decision Making
- a parent or carer whose child is 16 or over and the beneficiary of a financially means-tested card but are not considered a mature minor. Applicant to use the 16 and over parent consent form.

Criterion 2 – Be of school age and attend a Victorian school

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a registered Victorian school.

CSEF is not payable to a student attending pre-school, kindergarten, TAFE or who are home schooled.

Special Consideration

A special consideration eligibility category exists to assist families and students in certain circumstances. Applications should be made through this application form. For more information, refer to: Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF): Eligibility.

Payment amounts

The CSEF is an annual payment paid directly to the school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child. Please refer to the department's policy for the current rates and more information, Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF): Payment amounts.

How to complete the application form

Note: all sections must be completed by the applicant.

1. Complete the APPLICANT DETAILS section.
Make sure that the Surname, First Name, and Customer Reference Number (CRN) details match those on your concession card.
You will also need to provide your concession card to the school.
2. Complete the STUDENT DETAILS section for students at this school.
3. Sign and date the form and return it to the school office as soon as possible and no later than the end of Term 2.


